

## What's My Role? Public Water System Owner Responsibilities



As the owner of a public water system, you should:

- $\checkmark$  Hire the appropriate class and grade operator for your system
- ✓ Ensure your operator visits the system in person at least once a month
- ✓ Develop a contract to establish clear roles and responsibilities for each party
- ✓ Stay up to date with current rules and regulations
- $\checkmark$  Understand that the water system owner is ultimately responsible for the system
- $\checkmark$  Have a backup operator contact in case your operator is no longer available
- $\checkmark$  Prepare written instructions for times when the operator is not available
- $\checkmark$  Meet routinely with your operators to discuss ongoing issues and statuses
- ✓ Understand the importance of your operator's role beyond collecting samples

## You should NOT:

- S Place the entire burden of running the system with your operator
- O Delay paying your operator
- O Dismiss your operators' suggestions and insight
- S Rely on your operator to manage projects, permitting, and construction
- S Hire an operator just because they are the least expensive
